## **Instructions:**

## **Procedures for Certification**

- Providers must make written application and provide copies of all requested documentation to the Office of the Attorney General BIP Unit, for review.
- Certification is only for those programs providing domestic violence offender assessments and intervention services to domestic violence batterers.
- Certification is awarded for a two (2) year period contingent upon satisfactory reviews.
- The BIP Unit staff will review the application. Collateral contacts and site visits will be completed for the purpose of evaluating the program.
- The Office of the Attorney General and/or designee will determine if the applicant program meets the criteria for approval. The applicant may be offered "full", "provisional" or be denied certification.
- The fee for new applications for certification is: \$100.00, paid to the order of "Office of the Attorney General"
