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Renewal Application

Procedures for Certification

- Providers must make written application and provide copies of all requested documentation to the Office of the Attorney General BIP Unit, for review.
- Certification is only for those programs providing batterer intervention services, including the Kansas Domestic Violence Offender Assessment to domestic violence offenders.
- Certification is awarded for a two (2) year period contingent upon satisfactory reviews.
- The BIP Unit staff will review the application. In addition, this Unit may complete collateral contacts, complete site visits for the purpose of evaluating the program, and ask for additional information.
- The Office of the Attorney General and/or designee will determine if the applicant program meets the criteria for certification. The applicant may be offered “full”, “provisional” or be denied certification.
- The fee for renewal applications for certification is: **\$100.00**, paid to the order of “Office of the Kansas Attorney General”

Standards

Framework – Does your program operate within a framework of the following fundamental tenets?

1. **Yes** **No** This batterer intervention program, above all, is committed to the safety of victims of domestic violence and their children.
2. **Yes** **No** This program operates under the belief that battering is a pattern of behavior, not a singular event.
3. **Yes** **No** This program operates under the belief that battering is not an addiction or disease.
4. **Yes** **No** This program operates under the belief that batterers are not powerless over “persons, places, or things”.
5. **Yes** **No** This program understands that “codependency” and “enabling” are inaccurate, inappropriate, and victim blaming terms for survivors of battering.
6. **Yes** **No** This program operates under the belief that batterers are solely responsible for their violence and abuse.
7. **Yes** **No** This program operates under the belief that batterers must be held accountable for their violence and abuse.
8. **Yes** **No** This program operates with the understanding that alcohol and substance abuse do not diminish the responsibility for battering and are not causal agents for violent behavior. However, because alcohol and drug abuse is an aggravating factor, it should be addressed.
9. **Yes** **No** This program agrees that it may provide factual information, but must never take on an advocacy role for batterers in the legal arena due to the inherent possibility of collusion.

Program Goals – Does your program make the following goals the primary purpose for intervention?

11. Yes No The focus of this program is on interrupting, avoiding, and ending violence/abuse and on the batterer's capacity to change.

12. Yes No This intervention program uses the following goals in implementation:

- To increase the safety of victims, family members, and the community as a whole
- To enable the batterer to understand that acts of violence, abuse and use of domination and privilege are a means of controlling the victim's actions, thoughts and feelings.
- To encourage the batterer to acknowledge the battering and recognize it as a behavior choice, and to accept responsibility for its impact on the victim and others.
- To increase the batterer's willingness to change the battering behavior by examining the negative effects of the behavior on all relationships with the victim, children, friends, community, and self.
- To expand the batterer's understanding of the cause of personal violence and battering by examining the cultural, social, and personal factors that influence the choice to be violent.
- To teach the batterer practical skills for non-controlling and non-violent ways of relating in interpersonal relationships.
- To encourage the batterer to become accountable to those who are battered, children and/or others who are impacted, to take whatever actions are necessary to comply with the safety needs of the victim(s) and to make reparations for the effects of the battering.

Elements

13. Yes No Program intervention methodology primarily consists of the group processing approach.

14. Yes No This program challenges a batterer's belief system of domination and control.

15. Yes No This program understands that violence shall not be condoned under any circumstances and agrees that abusive behaviors, intentional or unintentional, shall be challenged and reported to the court or appropriate authorities.

16. Yes No This program maintains the philosophical beliefs that:

- Criminal consequences may result from battering behavior
- Batterers choose to be abusive
- The batterer shall be held accountable for personal actions and violence

17. Yes No In this program, payment is an indicator of responsibility. The batterer shall assume financial responsibility for the intervention.

18. Yes No This program has the option to charge fees based on a batterer's ability to pay (i.e. sliding scale), thus enabling the batterer to afford the program.

Program Role in the Community

Community-wide Coordination

19. Yes No This program works in cooperation with victim services and domestic violence programs as well as other key agencies such as courts, prosecutors, law enforcement and probation officers.
20. Yes No This program is linked with other service providers in order to make appropriate referrals.
21. Yes No The role of this program within the criminal justice system is either as a diversion or post-conviction sentencing condition.
22. Yes No This program will provide the judicial system with information regarding the intervention program and domestic violence offenders.

Victim Service Program

23. Yes No This program has a cooperative relationship with a local domestic violence victim service program in order to ensure support, appropriate referral information, and advocacy for victims.
24. Yes No This program participates in cross-training and cooperates with outreach efforts with the domestic violence service program.
25. Yes No Services to partners/victims are provided as a separate and distinct service and not only as a part of the batterer intervention program.

Technical Considerations

Selection of Participants

26. Yes No This program completes the **Kansas Domestic Violence Offender Assessment (KDVOA)** to identify those who use abusive tactics.
27. Yes No This program only accepts those participants assessed as appropriate.

Assessment of Batterer Participants

28. Yes No This program gathers preliminary information from multiple referral sources including: the referral source, the alleged batterer, and the victim, when possible.
29. Yes No This program requires the following information at intake:
- a. Name, telephone number, mailing/living address, date of birth, employer, address and telephone number of place of work, court case number, and emergency contact information.
 - b. Partner and/or victim's name, telephone number, mailing/living address, work telephone number and address.
*This information can be waived if it jeopardizes the safety of the victim or is unavailable.
30. Yes No The participant signs an agreement that includes the rules, goals, responsibilities, confidentiality restrictions, and fees. This agreement also includes a statement that all the information that is given is true, correct, and current.

Expectation of Batterer Participation

31. Yes No The evaluation of the participant for successful completion or graduation is measured by:
- Attendance at sessions
 - Attitude and cooperation with program rules
 - Active participation
 - Freedom from violent and abusive behavior *Coordination necessary with law enforcement, probation, and victims necessary to determine this.
 - Compliance with financial responsibility

Group Participants

32. Yes No The composition of the groups is restricted to batterers of domestic violence.
33. Yes No Male and Female participants are combined in the same groups.
If yes,
33 (a) Yes No This program structure and curriculum is designed to meet the needs of a combined group by having two group facilitators, with one being female.
34. Yes No Participants referred for battering their intimate partner are combined with those who are referred for abuse of their children.
If yes,
34 (a) Yes No This program has the appropriate curriculum and structure to meet the needs of combining these two groups of participants.

Facilitation

35. Yes No Groups are facilitated by co-facilitators, one male and one female, when possible.
36. Yes No Group size does not/will not exceed 20 batterers, with 8 to 15 batterers preferred.

Curriculum

37. Yes No This program uses specific written curriculum which includes a cognitive-behavioral approach for group facilitation.
38. Yes No The curriculum includes: identification, discussion, confrontation and change of abusive and controlling behavior to victims, including current and past partners and children. Also, all forms of domestic violence are identified and challenged including physical, emotional, verbal, mental, sexual, economic abuse, intimidation and the destruction/damage of pets or property.
39. Yes No The curriculum also includes: the short and long term effects of battering on victims, including children who witness the violence, with the dual goals of building empathy, as well as requiring the batterer to take responsibility for these effects.
40. Yes No The curriculum is structured to confront excuses for battering, including a philosophical stance that violence and abuse are the sole responsibility and choice of the batterer and are never justified.
41. Yes No The curriculum includes the identification and discussion of non-cooperative and abusive forms of communication and quick fix responses.
42. Yes No The curriculum includes the identification and practice of cooperative and non-abusive forms of communication, positive communication skills, long term solutions and responsible ways of treating partners, children, and others.
43. Yes No The curriculum includes the identification of cultural and social influences that contribute to battering behavior, without allowing these issues to excuse or justify individual responsibility of abuse and violence.

Prohibited Practices

44. Yes No This program agrees to not engage in the following prohibited practices:

- **Victim Blaming:** any intervention or approach that indicates a victim causes the violence or excuses abuse
- **Victim Coercion or Mandates:** any approach that coerces or requires mandatory participation by the victim
- **Couples, Marriage or Family Therapy:** as the primary intervention
- **Circular process or family systems approach:** any approach that treats violence as a mutually circular process
- **Addiction Models:** any approach that identifies the violence as an addiction and the victim/children as “enabling” or “codependent” in the violence
- **Containment Approaches:** Any approach that attempts to teach containment methods in an attempt to de-escalate the violence
- **Impulse Control:** Use of theories or techniques that identify poor impulse control as the primary cause of violence is prohibited
- **Psychopathology:** Any approach that identifies psychopathology on the part of either of the parties as the primary cause of the violence.

Restricted Practices

45. Yes No This program only uses the following interventions as part of a comprehensive curriculum, and NOT exclusively as primary educational approaches:

- **Psychodynamic:** interventions that link violence to past experience and unconscious motivation.
- **Communication enhancement/Anger Management**
- **Fair fighting techniques, getting in touch with emotions, alternatives to violence and non-threatening ventilation techniques**

Batterer Confidentiality and Safety Checks

46. Yes No The information that is available to courts, appropriate authorities, victims, previous victims, partners, and ex-partners includes, but is not limited to: assessment, findings, attendance, any use of violence or threats, reasons for suspension or termination, recommendations, and completion from the program.

47. Yes No In this program, probation and parole violation reports are made to the appropriate authorities.

48. Yes No For case monitoring and safety checks, this program requires a batterer to sign a release to address the following situations:

- Inform the victims and if unavailable, the victim advocate within 24 hours that the batterer is assessed for admission in the program
- Provide the information for safety purposes to the victim and if unavailable, the victim advocate within 24 hours of assessment.
- Prior and current treatment agencies to provide information on the batterer
- Provide information on the batterer to relevant legal entities including the courts, parole and probation officers, community corrections, and court services.
- Provide information to any person whose safety appears to be at risk from the batterer’s potential violence and lethality, i.e. the current and past intimate partner
- Permitting the program to disclose information to the court or investigative body about a batterer when his/her heir, executors or administrators file suit of complaint against the batterer intervention program which arises out of or is connected with, the intervention rendered or denied to such batterer by the program

49. Yes No Additional releases are signed by the batterer to:

- Provide the victim and if unavailable, the victim advocate, periodic updates regarding the batterer’s participation.
- Discuss group attendance arrangements with the batterer’s current employer (if requested)

Length of Program

50. Yes No This program is a minimum of 24 weekly group sessions, with intake/assessment and orientation in addition to these sessions.
51. Yes No Group sessions are a minimum of 90 minutes and do not exceed 2 hours.

Victim Notification

52. Yes No Upon admission of the batterer, this program attempts to notify the victim in a face-to-face interview (if permitted by victim).
53. Yes No If unable to notify the victim face-to-face, this program attempts phone and/or mail contact only after assessing victim safety or if the victim does not permit a face to face interview.

53 (a) If yes,

- Yes No This Program's contact with the victim provides:
- The purpose of the program
 - The procedure of reporting further offenses
 - A preliminary assessment for the victim's own use in determining risk
 - Limitations of the program
 - Resource information regarding victim services
 - Opportunity for the victim to provide input in the assessment process
54. Yes No This program either directly or through a DV victim service program assists victims to develop a safety plan.
55. Yes No This program makes at least three attempts to contact the victim and documents these attempts.
56. Yes No This program notifies victims of any change in the status of the batterer within the program, including the denial of admission or termination of the batterer from the program.
57. Yes No This program has a written policy which ensures that any potential victim of a batterer in the program is warned regarding any threats to his/her life within at least 24 hours.
58. Yes No If the victim cannot be contacted, it is documented that all reasonable avenues have been exhausted.
59. Yes No Appropriate reports are made to law enforcement and/or the courts when prudent.

Victim Involvement

Victim Generated Information and Participation

60. Yes No Victims are not obligated to participate in any way in this intervention program with the batterer.
61. Yes No The role of the victim in this program is solely to provide information.
62. Yes No If the victim chooses to share information, this information is only used with the documented consent of the victim and after a discussion of safety planning pertaining to the disclosure of that information.
63. Yes No The victim has the right to refuse further information about the batterer.

64. Yes No This program coordinates with victim service providers in the development of any public relations material pertaining to domestic violence.

Notice of Research

65. Yes No This program agrees to notify KCSDV of all research studies done with intervention programs to ensure that the research design accounts for victim safety and supports best practice.

Agency Structure

Supplemental Requirements

66. Yes No This agency/organization offers an environment conducive to safe business practices including, but not limited to:
- Proof of insurance (general/professional liability, fire, etc...)
 - Policies and procedures addressing employee safety such as when entering or leaving the premises, being alone with offenders, etc...
 - Policies and procedures addressing the presence of weapons on the premises, including any parking areas.
67. Yes No The location of this program does not create additional safety concerns for victims.

Personnel Qualifications

Employees

68. Yes No Staff employed by this program are violence free.
69. Yes No Staff hired by this program are not currently or formerly a domestic violence batterer unless: the program director is satisfied that the staff member has successfully completed an intervention program and remained violence free. This is accomplished by seeking input from victims/partners and the intervention program that was completed.
70. Yes No In this program, staff are free from any criminal convictions, diversions, or similar agreements in his/her life for at least five (5) years and co-facilitators for at least two (2) years.
71. Yes No Staff hired by this program are not a victim of domestic violence unless: the program director is satisfied that the potential staff member has successfully dealt with the issues related to the domestic violence.
72. Yes No All staff members are required to sign a statement that they are violence free.
73. Yes No This program has a policy which seeks to ensure that staff employed by the program shall not abuse alcohol, use illicit drugs or abuse prescription drugs and never allow alcohol or drugs impair their individual ability to function in a responsible and professional manner while performing work duties.

Employees continued...

74. Yes No Staff members employed by the program shall have a background free of conduct that bears adversely on his/her ability to provide required services and shall agree to not engage in conduct resulting in a criminal conviction or any other conduct, criminal or otherwise, deemed to impair the individual's ability to provide services or which jeopardizes the purposes of the program.
75. Yes No Any staff member who has allegedly engaged in conduct described above are placed in a position which involves no contact with either batterers or victims of domestic violence until it can be verified that such charges are unsubstantiated.
76. Yes No This program has a written ethics policy covering sexual contact with program participants and other staff, conflict of interest, personal issues regarding domestic violence and issues of power and control, racism, sexism, homophobia, discrimination and criminal activity.

Training Requirements for BIP Direct Service Staff

Training/Experience of Direct Service staff

80. Yes No Each BIP direct-service staff member has experience and training in interpersonal skills, group dynamics and specific issues in domestic violence as it relates to both victims and batterers.
81. Yes No Direct service staff have:
- A baccalaureate degree OR two (2) years of experience involving direct contact work with victims and/or batterers
 - AND 40 hours of direct, face-to-face co-facilitating experience in batterer intervention groups
 - AND 40 hours of domestic violence specific training that is approved by the accrediting body including, but not limited to: facilitation skills with batterer intervention groups (15 hours), completing the KDVOA (6 hours), completing victim contacts in a batterer intervention program (6 hours). Additional training hours may be completed on: dynamics of domestic violence, legal issues surrounding domestic violence, characteristics of batterers, victim safety and sensitivity to victims
82. Yes No Staff completing the Kansas Domestic Violence Offender Assessment are licensed by the BSRB.

Education and Training Requirements for Program Supervisors and Coordinators:

83. Yes No Intervention program supervisors/coordinators have a master's degree in social work, counseling, or a related field OR a bachelor's degree in social work, counseling, or a related field with an additional two years of intensive work experience in domestic violence.
84. Yes No Program coordinators/directors are licensed by the BSRB.

Continuing Education Requirements

83. Yes No Twelve (12) hours of continuing education were completed in the previous two years.
84. Yes No Content of CE training was approved by the Office of the Attorney General.
